

COORDINATOR REPORT

We completed a few big projects in 2023 and learnt a lot about what we can achieve at Greenhills, our strengths, and how we can build on the hard work of all those who have been involved in the centre over the last 40 years. A big thank you to previous coordinators Christine Burroughs and Anna Lee for all their hard work.

Project & Events

A major project for the year was running eight pop up food relief markets (thanks to funding from DFFH) from January-June. We were able to not only feed our local community but also host a range of cooking, gardening and waste-reduction activities.

Through Growing Greenhills, thanks to funding from Vic Health, we ran a series of family fun days, piloted a playgroup program and implemented healthy eating and environmental initiatives that have now become everyday practice at our centre.

Thanks to the Victorian Government and Banyule Council we have been able to run free events that connect our community. In Seniors week we have an open day and a multicultural fiesta to finish off the year.

Place

We are grateful for the funding from the Victorian Government through the Living Local -Community Grants Program. This has led to our outdoor deck being improved. We now have an outdoor kitchen, furniture and blinds which means we are able to run more outdoor events, utilise the space we have and enjoy the beautiful view of the Andrew Yandell reserve which we are so lucky to be nestled next to.

People

2023 brought about a fair amount of change in our team. We said goodbye to Elaine as our childcare coordinator. Elaine has been a constant at our centre for over 15 years and we are so grateful for her skill, care and hard work. Thankfully Elaine will be staying on as a casual so we can still enjoy her fabulous company.

We have had a few changes with Tutors at the centre, in 2023 we said Goodbye to Ange, Chris and Sabine who have been running wellbeing classes at Greenhills for over 20 years.

Chika, joined the Greenhills team this year bringing some extraordinary organisational skills and cooking ability.

Our strong team of volunteers, committee and community are what keeps us going. Together we have been able to care for our community and each other.

CHILDCARE REPORT

Greenhills Occasional Care offers an inclusive program for children aged 6 months to 5 years. We aim to work closely with our families to provide a smooth transition into care, ensuring a personal welcome and time for parents/carers to discuss any issues or concerns. We have a pre-enrolment visit with families to make sure individual needs are catered to.

The year 2023 was a big year for Greenhills Occasional Care. We said goodbye to our long-term coordinator Elaine and welcomed both Nicky and Lisa into the role. Elaine's impact on Greenhills is undeniable, after 15 years she has demonstrated great love and care for our beautiful gentle centre.

Nicky embraced the role with enthusiasm, however, family circumstances meant her tenure was short-lived. Lisa then joined the team and helped us to update all of our policies and procedures with thought, care and experience.

Our core team of staff helped us carry on throughout the year. A massive thanks to Belinda, Natalie and Kelsey for covering shifts, providing exceptional education and remaining a constant cheery face for our little ones in care. Our team of relief educators, Moira and Michelle helped us along as well.

In 2023 we ran 7 sessions a week, every morning and Monday and Wednesday afternoon to support the children at Greenhills Preschool.

Although 2023 was a year of change for Greenhills Childcare we are very proud to have provided quality care for our community and our parent feedback reflects that level of care:

ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY



Food Waste

We fight food waste in the broader community by sorting and redistributing waste from supermarkets (through Fair share and Second bite) but what do we do with our leftovers that aren't good enough to share with the community?

Our first step is always to give out what we can to those in need and the local community. Then, we have been pickling, preserving and exploring all the possible ways that we can extend the life of the produce that we rescue and keep it from landfill.

Volunteer & community favourites so far have been:

- Making kimchi
- Quick pickles in particular, Japanese pickling with Chika
- Seasonal jams
- · Dehydrated fruit, especially citrus for our teas and gin!

In response to the interest, we now have established a weekly People Pickling Group that runs every Thursday morning. Their preserved goods are then shared on Fridays and given out the following week. We have also increased our compost and worm farms by purchasing new bins and having a consistent turnover. Composting is an area that we wish to put some volunteer time into and improve next year.

Tackling excess cardboard, paper and plastic!

A pitfall in our food relief program is that it generates a large amount of cardboard and plastic waste. Together we have begun to takle this issue with the following solutions:

- Finding local gardeners that need cardboard for their garden
- Shredding it and adding to compost
- Using it for food relief community members instead of plastic boxes.
- Using it for kids craft activities (construction play at Family Fun Days)
- Using bottle tops for art projects and threading.
- With Bunnings Eltham we made a succulent wall using old pots, plants from around the court and plastic bottles.



ENVIRONMENT & SUSTAINABILITY

With thanks to a Banyule City Council Environment Grant we have continued our investigating and trialling of different ways that we can reduce waste produced here at Greenhills through our Recycle Incubator Programming.



As a part of this programming, we have been able to host an array of placebased family and age-friendly events and creative workshops that focussed on getting together as a neighbourhood to re-think and explore the ways that we can collaboratively re-cover and re-make with our waste.

Not only did we explore ways to prolong or upcycle materials through craft, we continued to host clothes swaps, and stock free clothes racks outside the Greenroom and in the office.

With our ongoing love of everything pre-loved and resusable, we participated in the **Garage Sale Trail** towards the end of the year. Being a part of this event allowed us to fundraise, raise awareness on the importance of extending the life of your stuff and reengage the local circular economy in the neighbourhood.

Greenhills sewing group, Sewing with a Purpose, welcomed new groups members, designed and produced new circular products for their local community, such as reusable cutlery sets, pot holders and more.

Month this year! With the fabulous Chika, we hosted a series of cooking classes that focussed on preserving food to minimise scraps as well as ways that those scraps could be utilised. Some of Chika's other cooking classes included, Traditional Miso and Shiratama Mochi Rice Sundae's!

We look forward to being able to host more cooking classes with a focus on accessibility alongside sustainability in the new year.

Note 1 - Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report includes the financial statements and notes of Greenhills Neighbourhood House Incorporated., a incorporated association, which is incorporated in Victoria under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

Policies Basis of preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform. Act (Victoria 2012). The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the general purpose financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

a. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and Equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the income statement during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Board commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The asset's residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the income statement.

b. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

Revenue

Grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating.

Grants received for specific programs are recognised as income only to the extent of work completed on those projects when the terms of the grants stipulate that any unexpended funds are to be returned to the sponsor if the program is not completed. In those circumstances the funds attributable to work still to be completed are carried forward as grants income deferred.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point of delivery as this corresponds to the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods and the cessation of all involvement in those goods.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

d. Income Tax

By virtue of its aims as set out in the constitution, the Association qualifies as an organisation specifically exempt from income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Employment Entitlements

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amount expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Contributions are made by the association to employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

g. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Related Party Transactions

The Committee Members act in an honorary capacity and are not paid for their services as Committee Members.

There were no transactions with related parties during the 2023 financial year.
