
A friendly, inclusive and connected community. We are the little house that thinks big!

# COORDINATOR'S REPORT

## Janelle Dunstan

*Invest, respond, make new connections.*

Though 2021 was full of lots of challenges we have had a fruitful year at Greenhills Neighbourhood House. We have been able to invest Greenhills as a place to find reprieve and make connections.

The groundwork and planning that went into the Greenroom and responsive programming in 2020 made another year of lockdowns easier to manage. Due to strong partnerships and a great team, we were able to achieve some wonderful things.

Thanks to the support of the DHHS social and community grant, we have been able to employ two staff and set up our Greenroom to be responsive and functional. Though there is much more work to do (we look forward to a renovation in 2022), we have been able to respond to increased demand, expand our volunteer programs and imbed new sustainability initiatives.

I am proud of our team for facing a difficult year with kindness and an excellent sense of humour. It has been a year of working hard and expanding our service despite lots of obstacles.

The childcare staff have responded to lots of changes, both in regulations and risk settings while caring for our families with warmth and skill. They have upskilled and made new connections that will stand Greenhills in good stead in the years to come. Their organisational skills and advocacy has manifested in new bathrooms, extended programs, and new ways to engage families.

Our food relief and emergency response has continued to grow in 2021, we have increased our service capacity. This has been done by working hard within the Food Collective, and Watsonia Neighbourhood House.

With the support of Banyule Council, we have been able to work on our digital capability. We have been able to try new programming both in person and online, including craft sessions, social groups, DIY (drilling and more.) We have also been able to build on and improve our key programming of wellbeing classes, Clothes Swaps, Plant Swap and family friendly activities. Our lovely neighbourhood house would be nothing without the people who make it special, so a big thank you from me.



# CHILDCARE REPORT

## Elaine - Childcare coordinator



Greenhills Occasional Care offers a supported and inclusive program for children aged 6 months to 5 years through 6 sessions across the week. A four-hour session is offered each morning and one 3 hour session on Tuesday afternoon.

We aim to work closely with our families to provide a smooth transition into care, ensuring a personal welcome and time for parents/caregivers to discuss any issues or concerns.



This year we have been continuing to update our policies, parent handbook and enrolment forms in keeping with the regulatory requirements. All our information for parents has been moved on to the deck to make it more accessible whilst covid safe practices are ongoing.

Although we experienced lockdowns again, we did welcome new families throughout the year building relationships with parents and children.

We were able to run sessions for about 20 children during the lockdown periods and online content was offered to all families.



# CHILDCARE REPORT CONT.

We have worked with an increased focus on sustainability, installing wicking beds in the garden, learning how to grow and harvest, using bottle tops for recycled artworks, encouraging families to use surplus fresh fruit and veggies from the Greenroom and installing a worm farm, in partnership with Veggie Empire, to put our scraps to good use.


We received a grant for Science Week activities and although we were unable to run the planned external events, we were able to run a great program within the sessions including simple experiments, pesto making with herbs from the garden and making our own fertilizer from banana skins for the garden beds.

All equipment was cleaned, organised and stored ready for the bathroom renovations over the summer holidays. The completed works make the bathrooms much more child friendly and aid independence. The installation of a toilet in the garden area has made a huge difference to our groups and enables a higher level of supervision for our little learners. All building works were completed with Banyule City council funding.

Although we were unable to have our volunteers for most of the year, they have remained connected and we look forward to welcoming them back in 2022.

Karen resigned at the end of the year, we wish her well with her new projects and thank her for all the hard work over the last two years. Thanks to Belinda and Natalie who have again provided great care and ideas in delivering a program both face to face and online during another challenging year.

# NEW PROGRAMS & ACTIVITIES

## WORKSHOP WEDNESDAY

We introduced the weekly Workshop Wednesday program, a semi-structured social volunteering session where community can drop-in informally and help out the House with any new projects and activities in the works.

## CRAFTY CHATS

Crafty Chats continued online during lockdowns and was later able to welcome new members in-person in the community garden and share a cuppa, craft techniques, projects and interests.

## SUPPORT & SWAPS

With a focus on developing our local circular economy and giving pre-loved objects or waste a second life, we developed a series of events, such as inclusive Clothes Swaps, and pop-up stalls. Community donated their aluminium waste which helped us buy fresh veggies for Food Relief recipients, donated bread-tags for Bread Tags for Wheelchairs and swapped household items and seasonal clothing to our swap events.

## ART PROJECTS

ACTIVATING AND BEDAZZLING THE COMMUNITY COURT!

We are passionate about collaborative art projects and were so lucky to support, collaborate and encourage local craft, making and art practices throughout the year. Some of the fantastic projects we were involved in were... **Lockdown In & Out**, a community art project with artist Anna Farago, inviting local community to share their Covid-19 experiences... **Court Art Board Exhibitions**, 'Favourite Tree' community photographs, drawing and connections, 'Drawings of Friends and Family' by Elyssa. We also produced a professional short doco-video, **Our Community**, thanks to a digital grant that let us showcase our community and House.

## DIY: HOW-TO

SHARE A SKILL | SCIENCE WEEK LEARNING AT HOME

Workshops championing handy-skills and hand tools! In lockdowns this pivoted to online tutorial videos on social media & our newsletter. These centred on home-skills and hobbyist activities with utensils more likely accessible in your home.

# GREENROOM

## COVID RESPONSE

Throughout Covid-19 lockdowns we were able to stay connected to community through place-based engagement activities and projects. We installed an external little food pantry for community to access outside of our operating hours. We also packed & distributed Covid Care Packs, where community could nominate a loved one and select goodies to be delivered to their homes by our Pantry driver amid restrictions.

## COMMUNITY GARDEN

Greenhills community garden was in constant flux with the painting, demolishing and incorporation of new veggie beds. We engaged with local neighbourhood gardens and small-plot holders where we were able to grow specific crops for the food relief program such as garlic and fresh leafy greens.

## FOOD RELIEF

Our Food Relief program has continued to thrive with the support of the Community Food Relief Fund from VIC Dept. of Health and Human Services, Inclusive Communities. With this we were able to employ a Pantry Project Worker to help coordinate this service across partnership sites. We expanded our volunteer program and saw a steady growth in the number of households seeking food & material aid. We also updated our Intake Forms to be more inclusive and worked on the expansion of storage in the Greenroom by installing new metal steel shelves that allow us to safely store long-life products and community donations.

## LITTLE LIBRARIES

We expanded our catalogue of Little Libraries outside the Greenroom to include a Little Pantry with Quick Grab Grocery Bags, Take-Home Activity Packs (alongside our online programs), Portable Clothes Closets and a seasonal Seed Library.

# TREASURER'S REPORT



2021 has been yet another challenging year for the House with COVID-19 impacting our ability to deliver our usual classes and activities available to the community. This was most obvious in the last half of the year. There were Zoom classes at low cost again offered when the community were unable to participate in person and these were favourably received.

There were also several outdoor activities held outside the Greenroom which helped with community connection. This was enabled through the Banyule City Council Covid-19 support grant allowing us to purchase outdoor equipment.

Childcare was available with some access limitations for part of the year due to lockdown but extra Childcare Subsidy payments helped towards staff wages.

The Social & Community Grant (\$73,509) received from DHHS in January was expended during the year with the running of the Green Room and expanding our food relief services and storage capacity.

We were successful in receiving not only our usual yearly Grant from Banyule City Council but a Digital Enablement Grant & the Covid-19 support Grant which were expended during the year.

There was also a \$2,000 grant received from NHVic for Science Week activities.

The availability of the JobKeeper payments from the Federal Government in the first quarter of the year (\$17,700) and Business Support Grants from the State Government from late August to late October during the lockdowns (\$43,400) helped immensely with the financial running of the House.

The year ended with a profit for the House of \$4,655.

We would like to thank the Banyule City Council and NHVic for these Grants and DHHS for our funding.

**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2021**

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**Note 1 - Statement of Significant Accounting Policies**

This financial report includes the financial statements and notes of Greenhills Neighbourhood House Incorporated., a incorporated association, which is incorporated in Victoria under the Associations Incorporation Reform Act 2012.

**Policies Basis of preparation**

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Reform Act (Victoria 2012). The Board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the general purpose financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

**Accounting Policies**

**a. Property, Plant and Equipment**

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

**Plant and Equipment**

Plant and Equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the assets' employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the income statement during the financial period in which they are incurred.

**Depreciation**

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the Board commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The asset's residual values and useful lives are reviewed and adjusted, if appropriate, at each balance date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the income statement.

**b. Cash and Cash Equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

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**c. Revenue**

Grants are recognised at fair value where there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all grant conditions will be met. Grants relating to expense items are recognised as income over the periods necessary to match the grant to the costs they are compensating.

Grants received for specific programs are recognised as income only to the extent of work completed on those projects when the terms of the grants stipulate that any unexpended funds are to be returned to the sponsor if the program is not completed. In those circumstances the funds attributable to work still to be completed are carried forward as grants income deferred.

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognised at the point of delivery as this corresponds to the transfer of significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods and the cessation of all involvement in those goods.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

**d. Income Tax**

By virtue of its aims as set out in the constitution, the Association qualifies as an organisation specifically exempt from income tax under the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997.

**e. Goods and Services Tax (GST)**

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of expense. Receivables and payables in the Balance Sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

**f. Employment Entitlements**

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amount expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Contributions are made by the association to employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

**g. Provisions**

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.


